**Tomasz Basiuk** (dr hab.) is a faculty member at the University of Warsaw American Studies Center. His research interests include life writing by members of sexual minorities and queer theory. He has published and taught courses on queer studies since the late 1990s. He authored *Exposures. American Gay Men's Life Writing since Stonewall* (2013) and co-edited *Odmiany odmieńca. A Queer Mixture* (2002), *Parametry pożądania* (2006) and *Out Here* (2006). Recipient of a Fulbright research grant (at The CUNY Graduate Center). Basiuk is a founding co-editor of *InterAlia: a Journal of Queer Studies* and was PI in the HERA-funded project Cruising the Seventies: Unearthing pre-HIV/AIDS Queer Sexual Cultures.

**Liz Bradbury**, Director of the Training Institute of the Bradbury-Sullivan LGBT Community Center, has more than 40 years of experience working as a professional advocate for the LGBTQ community and is recognized as a national expert on LGBTQ issues. Bradbury has presented hundreds of uniquely tailored trainings to vastly diverse businesses and organizations, training many thousands of people on LGBTQ issues. She has led three key LGBTQ civil rights organizations, she produced an LGBTQ newspaper for 18 years, she has written over 400 published articles and columns on LGBTQ issues, and she serves on several State of Pennsylvania government committees on social justice issues representing the concerns of the LGBTQ+ community. She helped to craft and pass key LGBT civil rights legislative bills in 10 Pennsylvania municipalities and state-wide, including the effort that began in 1998 to pass the first municipal non-discrimination legislation in Pennsylvania to include "gender identity" as a protected class, which successfully passed in Allentown, in 2002. Drawing on her longtime relationships with the LGBTQ+ community of the Greater Lehigh Valley of Pennsylvania, Liz Bradbury conducted most of the twenty-two COVID interviews for the LGBT Community Archive Oral History Project.

**Nils Clausson** is professor emeritus at the University of Regina (Canada). His articles and reviews on gay authors have appeared in *The Gay & Lesbian Review Worldwide* and *The Walt Whitman Quarterly Review*. He has been active in the LGBT rights movement since the early 1970s.

Mary C. Foltz is Associate Professor of English at Lehigh University and the Director of the South Side Initiative, which fosters collaborative research projects with community partners. Over the past four years, Foltz has partnered with staff and archivists at the Lehigh Valley LGBT Community Archive to produce a number of public-facing projects that focus on regional LGBTQ history in eastern Pennsylvania, including exhibitions and oral history projects.
